Unit I: Greetings

Introduction-Gallery Walk

The purpose of this activity is for students to recognize friendly greetings verse professional greetings. Place the 4 pictures around the room and allow the students to walk around, observe the pictures, and write down whatever they see in the picture. Afterwards, discuss what they see in each picture and discuss the different types of greetings that are common in different cultures.

Vocabulary: This unit is filled with different greetings, common phrases, and adjectives to describe how one is feeling. You can choose any activity to introduce and review the vocabulary. Take as much time as needed for the students to become familiar and comfortable using the vocabulary in this unit before moving on.

Activities: Here are a few different activities you can do for this unit.

Fill in the Blank:

Pass out a fill in the blank card to each student. Have them choose a feeling card to put in the box and then have them complete the sentence with the sentence starter under the picture box.


Role Play:

There are two different scripts included for 2 people to act out. One is formal between a teacher and student and the other informal between two friends.

Task cards:

These are activities to do in a small group. Have one student choose a card and do what it says. This should be done towards the end of the unit when they are feeling more comfortable with the vocabulary.

Wrap up: Play Tic-Tac-Toe to practice vocabulary and speaking. There are 4 different game boards to choose from. The vocabulary words can be cut up and read aloud for the students to find it on their board.
